BILL WHIRLED TO BRAWL

Hong Kong was a British colony until in 1977 when it was restored to China under the theory of "One country, two systems." which granted Hong Kong its own legal and economic system. Recently several demonstrations are happening in Hong Kong as a consequence of Hong Kong Extradition Bill 2019.' Extradition means shifting a fugitive from one jurisdiction to another. The bill was introduced on 3rd April 2019 by the Secretary of Security, John Lee, and submitted to the city's legislative council by Chief Executive of Hong Kong, Carrie Lam. It seeks to amend the fugitive offenders ordinance and the mutual legal assistance in criminal matters ordinance, therefore, updating existing law that governs extradition processes. The bill brings about a system of case by case fugitive transfers between Hong Kong and other territories which has no formal extradition record with Hong Kong. According to the bill if a suspect is accused of any of thirtyseven criminal offences including murder, sexual assault, money laundering and so on, then they can be extradited. The authorities pushed for the new law by citing the case of a 19-year-old Hong Kong man who allegedly executed his 20-year-old pregnant Taiwan girlfriend in February 2018. Since there is no preexisting agreement with Taiwan he could not be sent back to Taiwan for trial. Carrie Lam cited a legal loophole was preventing the extradition of fugitives. As stated by the draft, the Chief Executive would

have the authority to decide upon any requests and the LEGCO (Legislative Council of Hong Kong) would have no role in the process. Hong Kong's courts are not allowed to crossexamine the quality of justice and also only China's highest court can file an extradition request. Legal assistance can be asked by outside investigators for criminal cases. People who dissent the motion believe that the bill will sabotage the independence of Hong Kong's legal system. They doubt China's opaque legal system. Lawyers suggest that there are not enough safeguards for fair trials. Critics fear greater political interference from Beijing though China has patently denied any role in the policymaking. The protest erupted on 28th April 2019 with thousands of people marching towards Hong Kong's parliament demanding to scrap of the proposal. Ever since there has been no termination in the demonstration so far. From democrats to students and even other countries are triggered by the bill. The protestors had five core demand among which only the demand for withdrawing the bill was fulfilled on October 23 2019. There have been more than 1000 demonstrations and even after this year-long brawl, no upshot is there. Moreover on the ground of eradicating protests China passed a new national security law which will erode more freedoms from Hong Kong. The rage is still slithering and there is no new ray of hope imparting that this scuffle will end any time soon.
